Dear Employee:

Following is a brief summary of the main features of the Plan. For more details, please read the AAFES 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan Summary Plan Document provided on the AAFES Intranet.

If you have not enrolled in AAFES 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan within the first 30 calendar days from becoming eligible, you will be automatically enrolled in AAFES 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan at a contribution rate of 3% of your pretax eligible earnings. Based on your date of birth and assuming a retirement age of 65, you will be invested in a Fidelity Freedom® Fund - Class K with a corresponding target retirement date. You will also be enrolled in the Automatic Increase Program, which will increase the amount you defer by 1% on an annual basis. We encourage you to take an active role in the AAFES 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan and choose a contribution rate and investment options that are appropriate to you. If you do not wish to contribute to the AAFES 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan, you must change your contribution rate to 0% within the first 30 calendar days from becoming eligible.

Benefit from:

Retirement planning tools. You have access to online tools designed to help you manage your assets as you plan for retirement.

Convenience. Your contributions are automatically deducted regularly from your paycheck.

Tax savings now. Your pretax contributions are deducted from your pay before income taxes are taken out. This means that you can actually lower the amount of current income taxes you pay each period. It could mean more money in your take-home pay versus saving money in a taxable account.

Tax-deferred savings opportunities. You pay no taxes on any earnings until you withdraw them from your account, enabling you to keep more of your money working for you now.

Portability. You can roll over eligible savings from a previous employer into this Plan. You can also take your plan vested account balance with you if you leave the company.

Investment options. You have the flexibility to select from investment options that range from more conservative to more aggressive, making it easy for you to develop a well-diversified investment portfolio.

Automatic annual increases. Save a little more each year, the easy way — the Annual Increase Program automatically increases your contribution each year.

Catch-up contributions. If you make the maximum contribution to your plan account, and you are 50 years of age or older during the calendar year, you can make an additional "catch-up" contribution of \$6,000 in 2018.

Updating Your Beneficiary. AAFES employees are required to complete an on-line Beneficiary Designation on eBenefits at http://www.aafesbenefits.com.

Frequently asked questions about your plan.

Here are answers to questions you may have about the key features, benefits, and rules of your plan.

When can I enroll in the Plan?

To be eligible to participate in the Plan, you must be a regular full-time or regular part-time civilian employee of AAFES paid on the U.S. dollar payroll system and be a U.S. citizen, U.S. citizen national or permanent resident alien of the U.S.

If you have not enrolled in the Plan within the first 30 calendar days from becoming eligible, you will be automatically enrolled in the Plan at a contribution rate of 3% of your pretax eligible earnings. Your contributions will be invested a Fidelity Freedom® Fund - Class K with a corresponding target retirement date. However, we encourage you to take an active role in the Plan and to choose a contribution rate and investment options that are appropriate for you. If you do not wish to contribute to the Plan, you must change your contribution rate to 0% within the first 30 calendar days from becoming eligible. You may change your contribution rate at any time by logging on to NetBenefits at www.401k.com, or by calling a Fidelity Retirement Representative at 1-800-835-5098.

How do I enroll in the Plan?

In the 50 States and Puerto Rico: Toll-Free 1-800-835-5098. From Overseas, get an AT&T Direct access number by visiting http://www.att.com/traveler, or calling 1-800-331-1140 for a list of country codes, or by asking the local operator. After you dial your AT&T Direct access number, enter 877-833-9900 to reach the Fidelity Retirement Benefits Line.

You may also log on to Fidelity NetBenefits® at www.401k.com to enroll in the Plan.

When is my enrollment effective?

Your enrollment becomes effective once you elect a deferral percentage, which initiates deduction of your contributions from your pay. These salary deductions will generally begin with your next pay period after we receive your enrollment information, or as soon as administratively possible.

How do I designate my beneficiary?

AAFES employees are required to complete an on-line Beneficiary Designation on eBenefits at http://www.aafesbenefits.com.

What is the Roth contribution option?

A Roth contribution to your retirement savings plan allows you to make after-tax contributions and take any associated earnings completely tax free at retirement - as long as the distribution is a qualified one. A qualified distribution, in this case, is one that is taken at least five tax years after your first Roth contribution and after you have attained age 59½, or become disabled or die. Through automatic payroll deduction, you can contribute between 1% and 99% of your eligible pay as designated Roth contributions, up to the annual IRS dollar limits.

How much can I contribute?

Through automatic payroll deduction, you can contribute between 1% and 99% of your eligible pay on a pretax basis, up to the annual IRS dollar limits. You can request to change your contribution amount virtually any time by logging on to Fidelity NetBenefits® at

www.401k.com or by calling the Fidelity Retirement Benefits Line at 1-800-835-5098.

Annual additions to the plan (your contributions and company contributions combined) may not exceed 100 percent of your pay or \$55,000 for 2018, whichever is less.

What are my investment options?

To help you meet your investment goals, the Plan offers you a range of options. You can select a mix of investment options that best suits your goals, time horizon, and risk tolerance. The many investment options available through the Plan include conservative, moderately conservative, and aggressive funds. A complete description of the Plan's investment options and their performance, as well as planning tools to help you choose an appropriate mix, are available online at Fidelity NetBenefits.®

How do I know if my money will last through retirement?

Fidelity's planning tools are designed to help you manage your assets as you plan for retirement. Simply log on to Fidelity NetBenefits® at www.401k.com to access these tools.

What "catch-up" contribution can I make?

If you have reached age 50 or will reach 50 during the calendar year January 1 – December 31 and are making the maximum plan or IRS pretax contribution, you may make an additional "catch-up" contribution each pay period. The maximum annual catch-up contribution is \$6,000. Going forward, catch-up contribution limits will be subject to cost of living adjustments (COLAs) in \$500 increments.

You make catch-up contributions through payroll deduction, the same way you make regular contributions.

Can I take a loan from my account?

Although your plan account is intended for the future, you may borrow from your account for various financial hardship reasons (see your plan document for specific guidelines).

Can I make withdrawals from my account?

Withdrawals from the Plan are generally permitted when you terminate your employment, retire, become permanently disabled, or have severe financial hardship as defined by your Plan.

When you leave the Company, you can withdraw contributions and any associated earnings or, if your vested account balance is greater than \$1,000, you can leave contributions and any associated earnings in the Plan. After you leave the Company, if your vested account balance is equal to or less than \$1,000, it will automatically be distributed to you.

Can I move money from another retirement plan into my account in the Plan?


You are permitted to roll over eligible pretax contributions from another 401(k) plan, 403(b) plan or a governmental 457(b) retirement plan account or eligible pretax contributions from conduit individual retirement accounts (IRAs). A conduit IRA is one that contains only money rolled over from an employer-sponsored retirement plan that has not been mixed with regular IRA contributions. What is the Roth 401(k) Contribution Option?

A Roth contribution is available to employees who participate in the 401(k) plan. For payroll purposes Roth contributions are treated as after tax. This feature will allow participants to make Roth contributions to their plan while taking their earnings completely **tax free** at retirement—as long as the withdrawal is a qualified one. A qualified withdrawal is one that can be taken five tax years after the year of the first Roth contribution and after the participant has attained age 59½, has become disabled, or has died.

If you qualify to make traditional 401(k) contributions, you are eligible for a Roth 401(k) contribution.

How does a Roth 401(k) contribution option work?

You elect an amount of your salary that you wish to contribute to the Roth source, just as you would for your traditional 401(k). The contribution is based on your eligible compensation, not on your net pay—for example, if your total annual eligible compensation is \$40,000 per year and you elect a 6% deferral amount, then \$2,400 per year would go into your Roth 401(k) account.

Unlike your traditional 401(k) pretax contribution, with a Roth 401(k) contribution, you pay the taxes now on the contributions you make—but later your earnings are all tax free, if you meet certain criteria.

Example: Sally earns \$40,000 and has elected to put 6% toward her Roth 401(k) contributions and 6% toward her traditional 401(k) pretax contributions on a monthly basis.

Sally's monthly contribution into each account	\$200	\$200
Sally's reduction in take-home pay	\$200	\$150

^{*}This hypothetical example is based solely on an assumed federal income tax rate of 25%. No other payroll deductions are taken into account. Your own results will be based on your individual tax situation.

Your combined Roth and traditional pretax 401(k) contributions cannot exceed the IRS limits for the year.

Would a Roth 401(k) contribution option benefit me?

The potential benefits of Roth 401(k) contributions really depend on your personal situation, but are mainly focused on your existing tax rate and your anticipated tax rate at the time of retirement. If you are contributing to a Roth, you are giving up a tax break today for a tax break in the future.

Therefore, a Roth contribution might benefit you if your tax rate in retirement were **higher** than it had been during the years you contributed.

If your tax rate were **lower** in retirement, then a traditional 401(k) might be more beneficial to you than the Roth option. Talk with a tax professional for more information on how to determine if Roth 401(k) contributions are right for you.

Is a traditional pretax 401(k) still beneficial?

Yes. For many participants a traditional pretax 401(k) will still be the most beneficial type of retirement savings plan. We do not know what the future holds regarding tax rates. Therefore, it is not possible to predict with certainty which type of 401(k) savings will be most beneficial to a participant.

Remember, because Roth 401(k) contributions are made after tax, you may take home less money in your paycheck than you would if you contributed to a traditional pretax 401(k).
